EYPPAC Explained

The EYPPAC was developed through collaboration with adoptive parents. The purpose of the EYPPAC is:

- For those working in Early Years provisions to be fully aware of the needs and issues faced by adopted children and their parents.
- To encourage further positive collaboration between home and early years providers.
- To provide a forum for information-sharing, problem-solving and targetsetting.
- To ensure that the strengths and needs of adopted children are regularly reviewed by parents and early years providers.





The following points are emphasized throughout the EYPPAC process:

- An Early Years Provision Plan for Adopted Children (EYPPAC) will only be initiated when parents choose to identify their children as adopted.
- Maintaining confidentiality of information is essential. **Kent**

- 1. Contact your child's Early Years provider, e.g. Nursery, Preschool, Childminder, Children's Centre.
- 2. Contact your Adoption Support Worker

EYPPAC Meetings are chaired by an Early Years Advisory Teacher and attended by Early Years provision staff and parents. Parents may choose to invite others (e.g. Health Visitors, Support Services, Adoption Support Worker) to the meeting in discussion with the Early Years Provision.
